Nine Myths and a Truth About Teaching Kids to Read

How to plan responsive literacy instruction using assessment data

How can you link assessment data to +literacy instruction to be sure it's responsive to student needs? Using a readily available, free assessment resource (DIBELS) as an *example* we will think about how to plan assessment and use results. Phonics IS Fun! Bringing Structured Literacy to Life Within K to 3 Classrooms

The session will look at the active ingredients of structured literacy, including phonemic awareness, sound/symbol instruction (Grapheme-Phoneme Correspondences), letter formation, decoding and encoding, fluency and the use of connected text. Learn how to incorporate spaced and interleaved practice to meaningfully embed phonics instruction throughout the school day. The session will touch on how assessment information can support teachers in understanding where students are at in their learning, and next steps for instruction.
